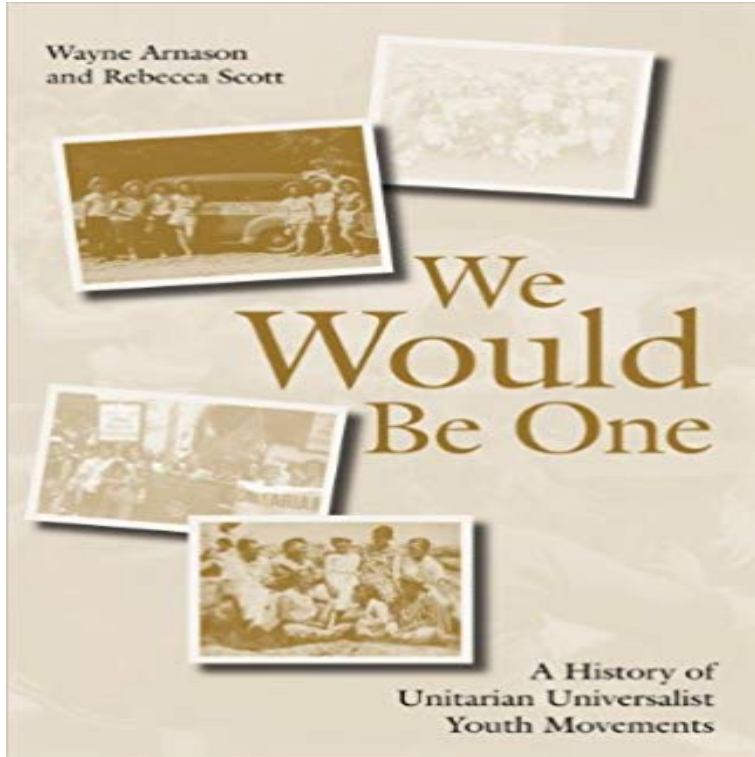


We Would Be One: The History of Unitarian Universalist Youth Movements
